

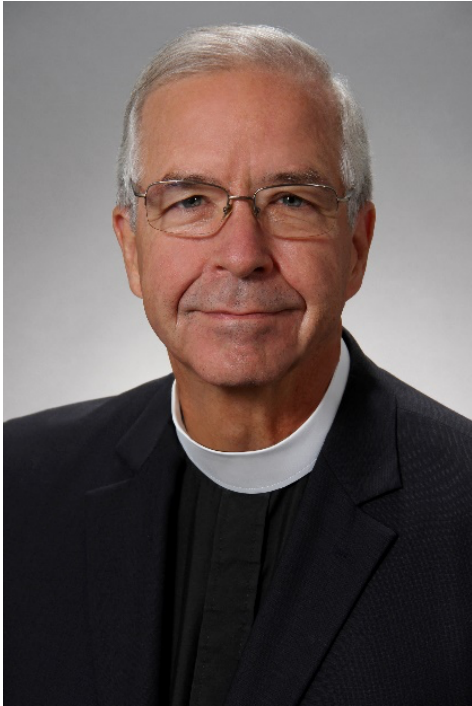
**Rev. Travis Dorman – current Diocesan Council member**
